

INTRODUCTION TO THE STUDY OF ITALIAN LAW
BASICS OF ITALIAN PRIVATE LAW

Second professional course of the Faculty of Law, University of Rijeka in Italian language

The Vice Dean for International Affairs, Faculty of Law, University of Rijeka is inviting students with basic Italian language skills to attend the second professional course "Introduction to the Study of Italian Law."

The course will be led by Professor Romana Pacia, Ph.D. (University of Trieste, Italy), Professor Francesca Fiorentini, Ph.D. (University of Trieste, Italy), and Professor Anna Zilli, Ph.D. (University of Udine, Italy), in collaboration with Sandra Winkler, Ph.D., Senior assistant at the Chair of Family Law, Faculty of Law, University of Rijeka. The course will be organised in the duration of 7/8 hours of lectures (all in Italian), and students will receive a Certificate of Course Attendance issued by the Faculty of Law, University of Rijeka.

The course is free of charge and will take place **from 25 to 29 May 2015** in the afternoon, according to the subsequently published timetable. We invite students of the second and other senior years of the Integrated Graduate Study of Law, who believe they can take part in lectures in Italian, to apply by sending an email to the email address **swinkler@pravri.hr** by **15 May 2015**. In their applications the students should briefly specify how they acquired their knowledge of the Italian language (for example, in elementary or high school, by attending a course, in a private or summer school, through conversations) without attaching any special documentation.

This year, the main content of the course will include various aspects of the historical development of Italian private law, an analysis of the structure of the Italian Civil Code (*Codice Civile*), and other legal sources of the national and European legislations, which continuously impose changes and new reflections on the Italian private law solutions. Furthermore, the course will include an analysis of a number of individual private law institutes, as well as a general view of the labour law structure in the context of the Italian Civil Code (*Codice Civile*). The course is also designed as an opportunity for improvement of the Italian professional legal terminology.
