## **Keynote Panel Lecture**

#### Professor Carlo Rimini (University of Milano & University of Pavia)

Carlo Rimini was born in 1966. He is Full Professor of Private Law at the University of Milan, Department of International, Legal, Historical and Political Studies, and Professor of Family Law at the University of Pavia. He is also Professor of Family Law at the Law School jointly managed by the University of Pavia and the Bocconi University of Milan. He authored more than eighty papers and other publications including three monographs published by prominent Italian publishers. He is a member of the International Academy of Family Lawyers (IAML). He also practices law as a member of the Milan Bar Association.

#### A Method Issue: From "Definitions" to "Rules". An Application for Answering a Family Law Question: Are Prenuptial Agreement Effective or Void in Your Jurisdiction?

Modern society is so complex that the work of the jurists nearly equals the attempt to govern the chaos. Various methods are employed in the process of identifying the rules and interpreting them. Since the 19<sup>th</sup> century – when the German school built up the modern juristic methodology looking back on the model of *Corups Iuris Civilis* by Justinian (Pandectism) – a number of new techniques have developed. Nevertheless, the German Pandectist method is still the common core of European legal experience: the starting point is a definition as the list of facts while the next step consists in application of the rule to the definition. This method is used to answer a very modern and both theoretically and practically relevant question: Are prenuptial agreements effective or void in a particular jurisdiction? The answer may differ from one European country to another depending on the definition of prenuptial agreement, a case in point being the Italian approach to this issue which will be discussed in more details.
