


INTRODUCTION

An academic institution belonging to the University of Rijeka, the Faculty of Law pursues excellence in higher learning by offering a strong curriculum for students seeking a degree in law. Each year the Faculty of Law admits 150 full-time and 50 part-time students to the first year of study. Since its founding in 1973, a total of 1549 students have successfully completed the program and graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.).

Legal education generally prepares students for careers in law, either in the private or public sector. The Law Faculty of the University of Rijeka has established a solid reputation by offering a unique four-year curriculum that prepares students to deal with the challenges facing contemporary lawyers. When setting up the curriculum, special efforts were taken to incorporate principles of legal education generally accepted by modern democracies dedicated to upholding the rule of law. The curriculum offered by the Rijeka Faculty of Law strives to stimulate the learning process and to encourage critical thinking, thus helping students develop the professionalism required of modern legal practitioners. Students of the LL.B. program are confronted with a broad array of legal issues, including the protection and promotion of human rights, the relationship of Croatian law to legal tradition and international law, as well as economic issues in countries with a market economy. Emphasis is also placed on building judgment and communication skills, while providing interdisciplinary knowledge essential for all those aspiring to achieve a successful career in law.

Attempting to provide an education that meets contemporary requirements, the Faculty of Law presents a curriculum consisting of three groups of courses. The first group includes mandatory courses covering the basic legal disciplines and other disciplines essential to a general legal education. The second group consists of elective courses in subjects of special interest, thus enabling students to attain a certain degree of specialization in areas of law of particular importance for this region. These include courses closely connected with international relations, maritime activities, transportation, human rights, etc. The third group consists of optional courses that enable students to acquire knowledge and training in special disciplines.

Professors and instructors are encouraged to use modern teaching methods. In addition to classical lectures, an increasing number of seminars and clinical exercises are being offered. Practical experience is also gained by organizing visits to judicial and administrative authorities and by establishing direct contacts with other legal practitioners, thus encouraging students to analyze problems from different perspectives. More recently, courses on contemporary issues have been organized and held in foreign languages by visiting professors.

The Faculty of Law also offers a postgraduate program in the Law of International Trade, Transportation and Insurance. More than 50 lawyers enrolled in the advanced degree program during the 1997/98 academic year. The program lasts four semesters. In addition to faculty members of the Rijeka Faculty of Law, lectures are also held by professors from the law faculties in Zagreb,

Osijek and Split, as well as by a number of distinguished university professors from Austria, Italy and Germany.

To help its graduates advance in their legal careers, the Rijeka Law Faculty organizes special postgraduate courses, including courses of specialization in various fields of law and practical courses, such as training sessions to prepare candidates for the bar exam.

In addition to their regular course work, faculty members are active in scientific work and are encouraged to publish. These activities, which constitute an important part of academic life, range from participating in research programs to establishing regular contacts with legal institutions abroad and at home, such as the Institute of Maritime and Transportation Law, the Institute of Criminal Law at Mošćenice and the Institute of Comparative Legislation. Several faculty members have benefited from extended visits at foreign law faculties. Others participate in the drafting of legislation or are temporarily holding public office or working as experts in government bodies.

Under the auspices of the University of Rijeka, the Faculty regularly publishes the *Collected Papers of the Law Faculty of the University of Rijeka*, a journal that focuses on theoretical and practical issues of law and the legal profession. The articles are written in Croatian or in a foreign language and are cited and reviewed in foreign journals. Located on the faculty premises, the library contains a growing collection of law books, textbooks, course materials, legal reports and journals and other periodicals, special editions and publications. The existing computer facilities have been recently upgraded with additional equipment and software.

In addition to cooperating with other faculties and departments of the University of Rijeka, the Faculty of Law enjoys close contacts with domestic and foreign institutions, judicial and government authorities as well as professional associations. Students and graduates have the opportunity to enhance their organizational and leadership skills through participation and membership in the Association of Students, in ELSA Rijeka, the local branch of the European Association of Law Students, and in the Lawyers Club.

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THE LL.B. PROGRAM OF STUDY

DEGREE

LL.B. (Bachelor of Laws)

DESCRIPTION OF PROFESSION

Legal careers in private practice or in the public sector: judges, public prosecutors, government positions; attorneys, notary publics; administrative lawyers in state and local government; commercial lawyers in enterprises and other commercial organizations; legal positions in diplomatic and consular service; other positions in various branches of business and in the government and local administration.

DURATION OF STUDY

4 academic years (8 semesters)

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Middle School or other four-year school approved by the faculty.

STATUS OF STUDENTS

Students have the option of studying full time or part time. Courses and seminars for full-time students are conducted thirty weeks of the academic year. Part-time study is reduced to half of the classroom hours prescribed for full-time students and is organized in cycles.

FACILITIES

Courses and seminars are usually held at the Faculty premises as scheduled to meet the prescribed daily load requirements (mainly from 08:30 to 14:30 for full-time students). Classes for part-time students are held in the afternoon hours. Classroom capacity: five classrooms capable of accommodating 486 students. Classroom I (theater layout) seats 260 students, classrooms II and III seat 108 each, and classrooms IV and V seat 54 students each. Consultation is available to all enrolled students in the respective instructor's office (two hours weekly). Classroom meetings outside the Faculty premises (if necessary and justified) are organized by the instructor in charge and are subject to approval by the Dean of the Faculty of Law. Lectures can be attended by all students enrolled in that particular year of study. Enrollment in seminars is restricted to 40 students in the first year of study, and to 30 students in the subsequent three years. The size of groups for exercises and practical training depends on the subject and place where the group meets. As a rule, smaller groups are preferable for practical training in a court of law, company or institution.

ACADEMIC CALENDAR

The dates when each academic year begins and ends are determined by the Senate of the University of Rijeka. As a rule, classes commence on October 1st and end on June 10th of the following year. No classes are held during Christmas and New Year's holidays and for the duration of the winter examination period.

GRADING OF STUDENTS

Students may be tested during the semester but final grades are determined on the basis of the student's performance at the final examination. Students may register for the examination in a particular course after attending the lectures, completing any required seminar papers and satisfying all other requirements for that course.

In principle, examinations are oral with the exception of the following courses: Theory of Law and State, History of Croatian Law and State, General History of Law and State, Roman Law, Foreign Languages, Law of Criminal Procedure, Family Law, Statistics, Civil Law, Law of Civil Procedure, Administrative Law, Private International Law.

EXAMINATIONS

Regular examinations are held during the winter examination period, summer examination period and autumn examination period, each of which lasts four consecutive weeks. Students may register for an examination in a given subject two times during the same examination period, provided at least 14 days have passed since the student first took the exam during that period. Extra examinations are scheduled once a month for students who have not passed one or more examinations from the previous year of study.

SEQUENCE OF EXAMINATIONS

Students are free to determine the sequence in which they register for examinations in courses belonging to a particular year of study. Examinations in a higher year of study can be taken only after the student has successfully completed all exams from the previous year of study.

Admission to a Higher Year of Study

Students are permitted to enroll in the next year of study if they have passed all examinations from the previous year of study, all but one examination from the previous year of study, or all but two examinations from the previous year of study.

ENROLLING IN COURSES AT OTHER FACULTIES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF RIJEKA

Third and fourth year students may choose to replace one elective course at the Faculty of Law by a course offered at another faculty of the University of Rijeka, provided that such course is related to the legal profession and is held no fewer

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hours than the elective course at the Faculty of Law. In each individual case the student must request special permission from the Dean of the Faculty of Law.

COMPLETION OF STUDY

After passing all examinations in the eight-semester program of study, candidates for the LL.B. degree must write and defend a thesis in which they demonstrate their level of acquired knowledge, their ability to think and make decisions independently and to use methods required in the legal profession. Students who have received at least two Dean's Awards for outstanding seminar papers written during the course of their law studies are freed from this obligation.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

A degree in law from a four-year university program and a minimum grade average of 3.00 out of a possible 5.00. Active knowledge of at least one foreign language.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

The curriculum consists of 11 courses, of which 6 last two semesters and 5 only one semester. There are required and elective courses. In addition to the required courses, all students must complete 2 of the elective courses offered. All students are required to write one seminar paper each semester. A student can enroll in the second semester if he/she has regularly attended classes and written and defended one seminar paper. A student must earn a certain number of points to enroll in the third semester, i.e., by writing two seminar papers and passing one or more examinations, each of which carries a certain number of points. A student has the right to select and register his/her Master's thesis upon acquiring 24 points. All requirements of the program are fulfilled when a student acquires 29 points by passing examinations and successfully defends his/her Master's thesis.

FACILITIES

Classes are held at the Faculty premises Friday afternoons and Saturday mornings. The classrooms are well equipped to enable efficient instruction with contemporary methods. A special section of the library is being set aside for specialized literature (primary and secondary) in the subject areas covered in the postgraduate program. This includes a number of domestic and foreign journals containing required reading for examinations. Additional literature can be obtained through the interlibrary exchange system operating within Croatia and with a large number of foreign law libraries as well.

VISITING PROFESSORS

In addition to the faculty members in Rijeka who organize and teach courses in the postgraduate program, professors and instructors from the law faculties in Zagreb, Osijek and Split have also been invited to teach, as well as distinguished university professors from Austria, Italy and Germany.


BERISLAV PAVIŠIĆ

INSTITUTES

INSTITUTE OF MARITIME AND TRANSPORTATION LAW

The Institute of Maritime and Transportation Law was established September 29, 1995 by virtue of a decision of the Faculty of Law of the University of Rijeka on establishing specialized units for advanced instruction and research in the field of maritime and transportation law and related areas. The goals of the Institute are to organize research teams to conduct scientific projects and specialized programs on matters relating to commerce and foreign (overseas) trade; to coordinate, analyze and propose measures to promote scientific research and projects at the Faculty of Law and the University of Rijeka, thus enabling faculty members to advance in their academic careers and improve standards and methods of teaching. Furthermore, the Institute should promote cooperation between the Faculty of Law and maritime and other economic institutions, thus enabling the exchange of professional expertise and providing opportunities to implement the results of the research projects. The Institute should also provide greater opportunities for cooperation with other law faculties in Croatia and abroad, as well as with other institutions and chambers of commerce interested in promoting scientific research and teaching in maritime and transportation law and other related legal disciplines. Finally, the Institute aims to cooperate with national and international organizations and associations in drafting laws and conventions which fall within the scope of the Institute's activities.

The Institute has so far organized a round table, several conferences, workshops and consultations on maritime demesne, ports and harbors in light of the new maritime legislation in the Republic of Croatia. In 1995 and 1996 two publications of collected papers were published: "Pomorsko dobro i koncesije" (Maritime demesne and concessions) and "Pomorsko dobro - društveni aspekti upotrebe i korištenja" (Maritime demesne - Social aspects of its use and exploitation). The authors are legal experts and professors from the law faculties in Split, Zagreb and Rijeka.

A project is currently in progress that deals with legal aspects of marine environmental protection. A publication is prepared which contains a collection of selected provisions from various laws on the protection of the marine environment.

Professor Vinko Hlača is Head of the Institute.

THE INSTITUTE OF CRIMINAL SCIENCES AT MOŠĆENICE

In cooperation with several foreign law schools and scientific institutions, this Institute is engaged in research work in the area of the criminal sciences and organizes academic seminars and conferences.



THE INSTITUTE OF COMPARATIVE LEGISLATION

The Faculty of Law of the Rijeka University and the International Law Institute (1615 New Hampshire Avenue, N.W., Washington D.C.) signed an agreement establishing the Institute of Comparative Legislation with its seat at the Faculty's premises, effective as of March 1, 1997.

The main objective of the Institute is to compile, analyze and provide access to selected legislation of the countries of Eastern and Central Europe currently in transition to market economies. The preparation and adoption of legislative texts presupposes the ability to analyze and compare legislation dealing with a particular topic. Therefore, the Institute will collect, analyze and compare legislative texts and materials. The legislative texts, analyses and supportive bibliography will be stored in a database and made available through the Internet.

The Institute is under the joint leadership of Professor Don Wallace, Jr., presently Head of the International Law Institute and Professor of Law at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C., and Professor Petar Šarčević of the Rijeka University Faculty of Law, presently Ambassador of the Republic of Croatia to Switzerland. The coordinator conducting the scientific research is Dr. Vesna Tomljenović.

PUBLISHING ACTIVITIES

THE PUBLISHING INSTITUTE

Established in 1995, the Publishing Institute of the Faculty of Law at Rijeka is a section of the library that specializes in publishing textbooks, course materials and special publications. The main task of the Institute is to provide law literature for students and others interested in contemporary legal issues and topics relating to the law and government of the Republic of Croatia.

Head of the Institute and Editor is Dr. Miomir Matulović.

COLLECTED PAPERS OF THE LAW FACULTY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF RIJEKA

The journal Collected Papers of the Law Faculty of the University of Rijeka has been published regularly since 1980. From 1995 onwards, it appears in the form of a double issue with 500 copies in circulation. As specified in a decision of the Ministry of Science and Technology, the Collected Papers is acknowledged as an internationally recognized publication which is cited in the Index to Foreign Legal Periodicals (Berkeley, California, USA), Current Legal Theory (Tilburg, the Netherlands) and in Recht in Ost und West (Berlin, Germany). The Collected Papers includes contributions from renowned foreign scholars, especially from Germany, Italy, Slovenia and the USA. As a rule, the articles cover topics in the fields of law, history, economics and politics.

LIBRARY

The Faculty library was founded in 1976. The initial library holdings consisted of 1370 books and old periodicals donated by the Faculty of Law in Zagreb from its supply of duplicates. Today the library contains 6000 purchased books and 4000 donated books as well as 250 domestic and 175 foreign journals.

The library holdings were recently increased by some 3000 books and periodicals donated by the estate of Dr. Viktor Ružić (1893-1976), a distinguished legal scholar, who was also Minister of Justice, member of the Sušak township administration, Ban of the Sava Province, librarian in Rijeka, member of the Rotary Club and attorney. An exceptionally well-educated man, Viktor Ružić collected books not only in the humanities and social sciences, law, philosophy, sociology and history but also in literature, poetry, the fine arts, theory and practice of music, etc. The books are published in the major European languages of his time and in various scripts (Latin, Cyrillic and Gothic). Most of the titles, however, are in German (around 900) and are printed in Gothic. The books are kept in the Special Collections Department and can be used only in the reading room of the Library on the Faculty premises.

Researchers and students are permitted to use the computer facilities in the Library where they have on line access to CARNET and the INTERNET.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

ASSOCIATION OF STUDENTS

The Association of Students of the Law Faculty of the University of Rijeka officially began its activities on January 2, 1997 when the elected student representatives commenced their third term. Namely, elections were held at the Law Faculty in Rijeka on November 12, 1996, pursuant to the Law on student associations by virtue of which a new system of student representation was established for the individual faculties and for the University of Rijeka. As of January 1997, the first, second, third and fourth year students are each represented by one student who is a member of the Faculty Council for two consecutive semesters. The four representatives form the collective presidency of the Association of Law Students. The Association's principal activities include the organization of various educational, cultural, sports and other programs of interest to law students. The Association also participates in the activities of other student organizations at national and international level.

To date computer equipment has been purchased which is also used by representatives of ELSA. Soccer and basketball teams have been organized and equipped for male students and a volleyball team for female students, all of which compete in the university leagues. Entertainment for students is organized on a regular basis and funds are raised to finance the work of the Association and other clubs. Representatives participate in the work of the Faculty Council and other Faculty services.

At the university level, students of the Law Faculty participate in the organization of student sports events and tournaments, in the publication of the student bulletin "Kacot" and other activities, particularly in the drafting of legal instruments important for the work of the Association.

President of the Association of Students of the Law Faculty of the University of Rijeka is currently Ronald Korotaj.



ELSA - Rijeka, one of the four national branches of the European Association of Law Students in Croatia, has been active at the Faculty of Law of the University of Rijeka since 1992.

ELSA is an rindependent, non-political and non-profit organization whose 25,000 members from 41 countries make it the most widely represented organization of law students and young lawyers. Its main goals include the development, promotion and support of academic and other contacts between law students and young lawyers. Above all, it informs its members about the importance of adopting uniform laws throughout Europe, teaches them about European law and introduces them to law as it is practiced in Europe today, thus activating their awareness and preparing them for law careers within the broad framework of European integration. ELSA organizes seminars and conferences, study meetings, student exchange programs for practical training, academic activities, study programs abroad and student publications (ELSA Law Review, A Guide to Legal Studies in Europe).

In the course of 1997, representatives of the Rijeka branch of ELSA participated in the international seminar at Copenhagen, the international conference at Rome and at the national assembly of ELSA - Croatia at Osijek. Under the auspices of the European Council a three-day "Meeting of Croatian Students" was held in Opatija at the end of March.
